Guidance to Federal Law Clerks on Post-Clerkship Employment Issues¹

In addition to the <u>Code of Conduct for United States Judges</u> and <u>Code of Conduct for</u> <u>Judicial Employees</u>, the federal judiciary offers guidance on ethics and professionalism in <u>Published Advisory Opinions</u>. These Opinions are issued from time to time in response to questions posed by judges. The Committee on Codes of Conduct, a committee of federal judges within the Judicial Conference of the United States, is responsible for the Codes of Conduct and the Published Advisory Opinions.

A number of Published Advisory Opinions concern judicial clerks and employment; for convenience, below are three opinions that federal clerks may find to be most relevant:
